Emory at Grady Career Impact Award

The Emory at Grady Career Impact Award has been established by the Emory at Grady Awards Committee to recognize a faculty member whose dedication to the mission of Grady Health System (Grady) has been evident over a long period of time.

The Career Impact Award is the pinnacle award of the Emory at Grady Awards. As the highest and most prestigious honor, recipients are ineligible for any future Emory at Grady award considerations.

Deadline: Nominations will be accepted through **August 7, 2026**.

Eligibility: All current Emory faculty with at least 50% of their clinical, teaching, or research effort on the Grady campus who have spent over **25** years of their career at Grady. Eligible nominees will have exhibited extraordinary efforts that impact patients, families, communities, and trainees at the local, regional, and/or national level.

Examples include but are not limited to:

- Has shown a career dedication to furthering the mission of Grady
- Has provided important administrative service to the Emory at Grady community
- Has spent their career advancing health equity and improving the quality of health and well-being of Grady patients
- Has demonstrated sustained and distinguished educational contributions that impact the careers of learners

Nominations: Faculty must be nominated by a faculty or staff member or a trainee of Emory University. The nomination should consist of a concise narrative (500 words or less) describing the long-term impact of the nominee's career on Grady and the communities it serves.

Submission: Must be submitted using the Online Nomination Form and include the following:

- Nominating letter (500 words or less)
- Nominee's current Curriculum Vitae

Decision: Will be made by the Emory at Grady Awards Committee.

Award: The recipient of the Emory at Grady Career Impact Award will be announced and honored at the annual Emory at Grady Awards Ceremony.
