What is the best vacation you have ever taken?



BurgerMD Recommends

It is unusual for a restaurant to open its doors during a pandemic, but The Companion, located at 2316 Marietta Road Northwest in Atlanta's Upper Westside, did it just right. While not considered officially open, you are able to put in an order for either takeout, or to eat at their outdoor patio with “socially distanced” tables. Chef Andy Gonzales is behind its concept, and for any of you who know Steinbeck’s Ale House in Decatur, this is a sister restaurant.

The menu is relatively simple, not a whole lot of options, but for those of you who love burgers and wings, this is the right place for that. On my visit there, they had two options for burgers and both were great. The Tower of Power double-patty beef burger was a great take on a classic cheeseburger, but the Steinbeck burger (which I liked way more) is for the Pimento cheese lovers. They come with tater tots, which are a perfect side. Their wings are also smoked, my favorite kind. The menu may change depending on the day, but those are definitely a few of the great recommendations. The staff is EXTREMELY kind. They have hand sanitizer, and the waiters wear gloves and masks.

I definitely recommend this place, especially for takeout or getting to sit in a safe outdoor space during the pandemic. Hope you enjoy!
