Bios:**Dr. Gavin Harris**

Dr. Gavin Harris is a faculty member at Emory University School of Medicine. He is dually appointed in Critical Care Medicine and Infectious Diseases with professional interests in disaster preparedness, rapid diagnostics, biosecurity, and the treatment of high consequence pathogens.

Dr. Anna Yaffe

Dr. Anna Q. Yaffee is an Assistant Professor of Emergency Medicine, practicing clinically at Grady Memorial and Emory University Hospitals. She serves as the Emergency Medicine liaison to the Emory Serious Communicable Diseases Unit and assists with frontline serious communicable disease preparedness for the Emory Healthcare system as well as nationally through the National Emerging Special Pathogens Training and Education Center.

Dr. Yaffee also serves as Director of the Global Health in Emergency Medicine Section. Her primary clinical/scholarly focus is Public and Global Health in Emergency Medicine, including emergency medicine capacity building, preparedness, and humanitarian response.

Dr. Yaffee is a board-certified emergency medicine physician, who received an MD (2012) and MPH (2008) from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, MI and completed her emergency medicine residency and chief residency (2015) at Emory University. Before returning to Emory as faculty, Dr. Yaffee served as a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Public Health Service and worked as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Dr. Brian Costello

Dr. Brian Costello is Associate Professor of Pediatrics and Emergency Medicine at Emory University and a pediatric emergency medicine attending physician at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta (CHOA). He is Faculty Coordinator for Disaster Medicine for Emory's Division of Pediatric Medicine and serves on CHOA-Egleston Hospital's Emergency Management Committee. He also directs simulation education for Emory's Pediatric Emergency Medicine fellowship. He is a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics Section on Emergency Medicine Disaster Medicine Subcommittee, through which he has reviewed and implemented online disaster education modules and served as a regional FEMA champion for a pandemic influenza investigation. He has co-authored multiple publications on the emergency care of seasonal and pandemic influenza in children.

Dr. Jay Varkey

Dr. Jay B. Varkey is an Associate Professor of Medicine in the Department of Medicine, Division of Infectious Diseases, at the Emory University School of Medicine. He received his BA in International Affairs and Political Science and graduated with honors from Marquette University in 1998. In 2002, he

graduated from the Medical College of Wisconsin where he was a member of the Alpha Omega Alpha honor society. He completed his residency in Internal Medicine and fellowship in Infectious Diseases at Duke University Medical Center.

He was recruited to the Emory University School of Medicine in 2009 to become the medical director of the antibiotic stewardship program at Emory University Hospital where he currently serves as Hospital Epidemiologist. He is an active teacher and lecturer. His research interests are focused on improving patient outcomes by optimizing the use of antimicrobials and reducing healthcare associated infections.

In Fall 2014, Dr. Varkey was one of five infectious diseases physicians that provided direct care to 4 patients with Ebola virus disease treated in the Serious Communicable Diseases Unit (SCDU) at Emory University Hospital including the first 2 patients with Ebola treated in the United States. During both the 2014 Ebola outbreak in West Africa and throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, Dr. Varkey has been invited to provide medical expert commentary to multiple media organizations in newspapers, radio, and on television including multiple appearances in the Associated Press, National Public Radio, NBC, CBS, ABC, and CNN.

Dr. Colleen Kraft

Dr. Kraft is a Professor in the Department of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine and the Department of Medicine, Division of Infectious Diseases. She is the President-Elect of the American Society for Microbiology, beginning in July 2021. Dr. Kraft is trained and board certified in Internal Medicine, Infectious Diseases, and Medical Microbiology. Dr. Kraft has had clinical and diagnostic experience in 3 infectious diseases epidemics: 2009 H1N1 pandemic influenza, Ebolavirus in 2014, Lassa in 2016, and currently COVID-19. Dr. Kraft led system-wide coordination of COVID-19 diagnostic testing, and has served on national, state, and local advisory committees. Her experience in clinical care of novel diseases led to the development of the Emory Human Healthcare Factors Lab. Dr. Kraft also works on antibiotic resistance elimination with the use of microbiome-therapeutics such as fecal microbiota transplants.
