Robotic surgery debuts at the Atlanta VA Healthcare System

The years-long process of obtaining approval for instituting robotic surgery at the Atlanta VA Healthcare System culminated in mid-April 2021 with the installation of the hospital's first da Vinci robotic surgical platform. Shortly thereafter, Jackson Slappy, MD, Associate Chief of Surgery at the VA, performed the first robotic procedure to be done at the facility, a cholecystectomy. Established robotics practitioner and advocate Ankit Patel, MD, advised the effort and assisted with training, and Jonathan Pollock, MD, Chief of General Surgery at the VA, served on the working group that planned and prepared for accommodating the new technology. "I was particularly inspired by Dr. Slappy's tireless leadership as he worked the robot initiative through the VA approval process," Dr. Pollock says.

1,000th heart transplant performed at Emory University Hospital

Tyrone Baldwin (above, with his wife) became the 1,000th heart transplant patient at Emory University Hospital, making Emory Healthcare the first health care system in

Georgia to reach this milestone. After a four-month stay, Tyrone Baldwin left the hospital last month with a new heart.

"We, at Emory, are committed to providing all Georgians access to the highest quality of care across the spectrum. Our heart transplant program provides the most advanced therapies for heart failure available anywhere," says Mani Daneshmand, MD, Director of the Emory Heart & Lung Transplantation, Mechanical Circulatory Support and Emory ECMO Programs.

In 2020, Mr. Baldwin had bariatric surgery to help him lose weight so he could be listed for a heart transplant. Emory Bariatric Center surgeon Ankit Patel, MD, performed the complex sleeve gastrectomy, which was successful. "The combination of Mr. Baldwin's willpower with the quality of the surgery performed by Dr. Patel contributed to an optimal BMI for good long-term results of transplantation," says Edward Lin, DO, the center's Surgical Director.

David Vega, MD, Professor of Surgery in the Division of Cardiothoracic Surgery, is estimated to have performed nearly half of these 1,000 heart transplants. He attributes the program's successes to support by hospital leadership and a focus on patient care. "For 36 years, we have been supported by excellent institutional commitment, which has assisted us in caring for numerous patients who have exhausted all options for end-stage heart disease," he says.
