Colquitt Regional Medical Center and the School of Medicine were recently highlighted in a news report by WALB for their partnership to establish a rural surgical residency rotation. As part of the program, Colquitt will host one resident a month over a period of 12 months, which will also help address medical needs in rural areas while providing residents with experience in spaces outside of the Atlanta metro area.

Colquitt Regional is located in Moultrie, near the Florida border, approximately three hours south of Atlanta.



IVYY Project Selected for Kaiser Permanente 2023 Grant **Award**

The Interrupting Violence in Youth and Young Adults Project (IVYY) at Grady has been selected as a winner for the Kaiser Permanente Center for Gun Violence Research & Education (KP Center for GVRE) 2023 Summer Grant Award. The grant will provide \$100,000 to IVYY, a hospital-based violence intervention program whose mission focuses on patients ages 14 - 34 who are victims of violence or assault.



New Textbook Released with Editor Mani Daneshmand





His articles have been published in a number of leading journals including *Pediatrics*, Cardiology, and Transplantation.




Seth Concors, MD Assistant Professor, Surgical Oncology, Department of Surgery





Randi Smith Wins \$2 Million Grant to Support Violence Prevention Intervention Efforts at Grady

Randi Smith, MD, MPH, was named the recipient of a \$2 million Department of Justice (DOJ) Grant Award under the Office of Justice Programs Community Violence Intervention and Prevention Initiative (CVIPI). This award is in recognition of Dr. Smith's work spearheading the Interrupting Violence in Youth and Young Adults (IVYY) program, a hospital-based violence intervention program at Grady Memorial Hospital.

The award is part of a DOJ initiative to support public safety and community justice activities and to "curb violence, serve victims and youth, and achieve fair outcomes through evidencebased criminal and juvenile justice strategies."



Emma Crichton Wins 2nd Place in Claude Organ Jr. Resident Research Competition

General surgery chief resident Emma Crichton, MD, won a second place award in the Claude Organ Jr. Resident Research Competition at the 33rd Annual Society of Black Academic Surgeons (SBAS) Meeting for her work in transplant immunology. Elissa Falconer Matches into Colorectal Surgery Fellowship at University of Louisville


