




25 Years of the Emory Center for AIDS Research (Emory CFAR)

*Major milestones & investigator accomplishments in
HIV research at Emory University*

1998




The **Emory CFAR** was founded with \$8.2M in NIH HIV research dollars at Emory. This funding has grown eightfold to \$67.8M in 2023. Likewise, Emory's financial commitment to the CFAR tripled since 1998.

2000




The **CFAR HIV Disease Registry** was first established. It relaunched with EPIC medical data in 2012 and joined NA-ACCORD in 2019. It is now the largest single-site disease registry in the country.

2002




Emtriva, an HIV treatment drug developed at Emory, was approved for once a day, oral administration.

2004




One of the firsts of its kind, the Emory and Penn CFARs launched the **Social and Behavioral Sciences Research Network** (SBSRN) to foster national transdisciplinary HIV research collaboration.

2006


AIDSVu 
AIDSVu, an Emory-developed interactive online mapping tool, was first funded. It provides key data and visualizes the impact of the HIV epidemic on communities across the United States.

2008



The **Consortium for Innovative HIV/AIDS Vaccine and Cure Research in Nonhuman Primates** at Emory was initiated. By 2023, it supports collaborations spanning 20 researchers and seven institutions


2010



The **Emory-CDC HIV/AIDS Clinical Trials Unit** was launched to support NIH HIV clinical trials. In 2023, it comprises 4 clinical research sites based in Atlanta, Mexico, and the Philippines.

Also in 2013, the Atlanta Women's Interagency HIV Study (WIHS) was formed. The site was expanded in 2019 to the **Atlanta MACS/WIHS Combined Cohort Study** to assess the impact of chronic health conditions on men & women living with HIV.


2012



The **Pediatric and Adolescent Clinical Trials Unit** was established with Emory's selection as an IMPAACT study site. In 2023, Emory also became an official Adolescent Trials Network (ATN) site.



2016



The **CFAR Community Liaison Council (CLC)** was formed to support open communication between local researchers and community members in Metro Atlanta.

2018




The Emory CFAR was awarded the **Emory Training Program in HIV Translational Research to End the Epidemic** — Emory's first HIV-focused T32 grant.

Emory faculty were selected to lead three **Martin Delaney Collaboratories (MDC) for HIV Cure Research** —

- 1) **ERASE HIV**, the only MDC based at Emory;
- 2) **PAVE**, the first pediatric-focused MDC;
- 3) **RID-HIV**, focused on immune-based treatments.

2020



The Emory CFAR was awarded its latest round of NIH CFAR **Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE)** grants. Since 2019, Emory has received nine EHE scientific projects, totaling \$2.75M.
