SPOTLIGHTS

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: Aaron Gluth, MD

Currently, Aaron Gluth splits his time working as a Hospitalist at EUH and med-psych consultant on the inpatient psychiatry unit (previously Emory Wesley Woods Hospital, now 2800 Emory Decatur Hospital). He is also a member of the EUH Ethics Committee and the EUH Schwartz Rounds Planning Committee.

Aaron has enjoyed giving talks about medical ethics and the medical care of patients with severe mental illness at various conferences, but his most important role outside of the hospital is new dad to a 10-month-old boy who already thinks he is a toddler. What he most enjoys at work is providing collaborative care to complex, and often medically underserved, patient populations.

Aaron was lucky to have found an institution supporting the med-psych mission, both in residency training, and in practice. His mentors in both psychiatry and medicine gave him guidance in how to carve out a med-psych role at Emory fresh out of residency.

ADJUNCT FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: Debbara Dingman, PhD

Debbara Dingmanvis a senior partner at Pine River Psychotherapy Associates. She is a member of the American Psychological Association, a fellow of Georgia and as a member of the American Academy of Pychotherapists she serves on the Executive Committee and the Ethics Committee. STAFF SPOTLIGHT: Danielle Belva

Danielle Belva is currently a prescribing clinician for Adult Services at Emory Autism Center (Medication Clinic), an adjunct faculty member and preceptor for psychiatric nurse practitioner students at Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing, a lead psychiatric consult for the Georgia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities consultation team, as well as serving on multiple committees at Autism Center.

What Danielle most enjoys about her work is the direct/1:1 interaction with her patients and families. She has worked with many of them for years, so she knows their daily struggles, as well as their growth/accomplishments. It is also rewarding to be able to find a medication or combination of medications that improves their quality of life. In the field of development disabilities, particularly for adults with disabilities, there are few resources. She feels very grateful to be a resource they can count on.

Key highlights of Danielle's career trajectory to date include becoming a Registered Nurse in 1984. She worked in neurology for the first five years, then started working in psychiatric nursing. In1999, Danielle obtained her Master of Science in Nursing and became board certified as a Psychiatric Clinical Nurse Specialist. In 2015, she started working as an APRN at Emory Autism Center in their Adult Services, and in 2023 received a Provider of Excellence Award. The FY23 Press Ganey Patient Satisfaction

Survey results identified her as one of Emory Physician Group Practices highly rated Providers (top 10%).

Outside of work, family and friends are very important to Danielle, and her four rescue animals bring much joy. She also enjoys good food and music of all kinds including blues, chamber, folk and Big Band. Danielle enjoys anything outdoors that includes jogging, biking hiking and sitting outside for dinner. Travel is also very important to her. Last year she traveled from Paris to Nice. The year she went to Botswana for a safari, followed by Zimbabwe to see Victoria Falls then Cape Town to see the penguins!

TRAINEE SPOTLIGHT: Nancy Gimbel, PhD

Nancy Gimbel serves as a psychology postdoctoral resident with the Psychiatry Consultation Liaison Service at Grady and with the Nia Project, where she recently completed co-leading two weekly therapy groups, including Acceptance and Commitment Therapy for Chronic Pain and Emotion Regulation and Empowerment. She is also passionate about clinical supervision and training so was excited to serve as a clinical supervisor for psychology doctoral practicum students with Nia and the CL Service and serve as a member of the Psychology Postdoctoral Resident Application Review Committee and the Internship Application Review Committee.

Prior to pursuing a career in clinical psychology, Nancy served in higher education program leadership for almost 20 years, primarily at Georgia Tech and Emory University, with her most recent role being Assistant Dean of Student Engagement for MBA Program at the Scheller College of Business at Georgia Tech. She has always been passionate about working with people experiencing significant life changes and sees her transition to clinical psychology as a natural career progression and a deepening of her commitment to partnering with people experiencing difficult life challenges. Immediately prior to her postdoctoral role at Emory, she served as a predoctoral intern at Vanderbilt University Medical Center, focusing most of her clinical work at the Osher Center for Integrative Health.

As a postdoctoral resident on the Psychiatry Consultation Liaison Service, Nancy works with patients during one of their most vulnerable and frightening experiences. Hospitalization for medical trauma is often accompanied by severe distress, uncertainty and loss of independence and dignity. The experience can be disorienting and demoralizing. Although facilitating psychological interventions with hospitalized patients can be challenging, this is incredibly important and rewarding work. It is Nancy's honor to work with patients as they start a psychological healing process that will extend months or years after their time at Grady. Most of her patients have never worked with a psychotherapist, and it gives me immense pride to introduce them to the benefits of psychotherapy. Nancy hopes their encounters motivate them to pursue outpatient psychotherapy to continue their healing. Additionally, leading therapy groups with the Nia Project has been one of her most enjoyable postdoc experiences. People heal through connection, and the Nia therapy groups provide safe spaces for group members to connect with other survivors, heal from severe trauma and learn new coping skills to improve their mental and physical health and their relationships. It is an

incredible honor to partner with the Nia members during their journey and introduce them to the healing power of group therapy.

Throughout Nancy's career she has sought positions with organizations attempting significant change, including building new academic programs, addressing leadership challenges, enhancing team performance and improving operational effectiveness. She is most proud of her work with the fantastic faculty and staff at the Georgia Tech Scheller College of Business. For many years they worked together to reinvigorate several of their undergraduate and graduate programs, elevating them to national prominence. Nancy is excited to bring this creativity and entrepreneurial spirit to her next position as a clinical health psychologist at Wellstar Health System, where she will play a leadership role in Wellstar's launch of integrated behavioral health services in their Women's Health clinics.

This fall Nancy will start working as a clinical health psychologist at Wellstar Health System, working in an integrated Women's Health Clinic. Wellstar plans to integrate behavioral health services into all its women's health clinics over the next few years, and she is excited to be a part of this important initiative. Additionally, her many years of working in education has developed an interest in clinical supervision and training. Due to this, she plans to supervise doctoral trainees and hopes to be a director of clinical training in the future.

Outside of work, Nancy loves being outdoors and particularly enjoy hiking. She also enjoys urban walking and spend many evenings and weekends walking on the Atlanta beltline and exploring local neighborhoods. She also loves history and international travel and will add tours of historical sites to almost every vacation.

MENTOR SPOTLIGHT: Julie Kable (written by Kallio Hunnicutt-Ferguson with contributions from Matt Segal, Alex Perez and Jennifer Holton)

Dr. Julie Kable in an outstanding mentor. She consistently makes herself available to discuss career planning, think through ways to support mentees' career goals and provide support and guidance. As a woman leader in our department, she also has experience balancing family and career and is a helpful resource when these types of questions arise in one's career development.

Julie has served as a mentor to me in terms of research, as well as curriculum development in certain areas. I came to Emory with very little research background, but through my clinical work with her in the Emory Neurodevelopmental Exposure Clinic (ENEC), she helped me establish the medication management portion of the clinic in a way that would enable us to collect data and investigate questions about the care of these children. She supported collaborative efforts in writing scholarly articles for publication and in developing presentations for national meetings. I would not have had the knowledge or the courage to pursue these scholarly efforts without her mentorship, quidance and support.

Julie has also made herself available to all trainees who have any interest in research, whether it is in her area of research or not. During fellows' rotations with her in ENEC,

she spends a tremendous amount of uncompensated time reviewing the literature with them and encouraging them to ask questions and develop research interests. Julie took a very person-centered mentorship approach, collaboratively discussing goals for the mentoring relationship and as a result has focused on helping several of her mentees prepare for promotion. She has contributed positively to our understanding of and strategies for navigating this challenging process.

What makes Julie a good mentor is she has excellent inside knowledge of the promotion processes and balances her own experience, knowledge of the rules and what we need as mentees to get us the best information and perspectives possible. Her open, supportive and nonjudgmental approach also really helps to feel comfortable and to truly be able to explore our own barriers and challenges in navigating professional challenges, and therefore to benefit most from the mentoring relationship. From a research standpoint, Julie has excellent knowledge and grasp of statistics and therefore been invaluable in navigating the research and publication process.

Julie has been my mentor for the past five years, demonstrating exceptional qualities in her role. She excels in making her mentees feel heard and actively collaborates with them to find the best solutions, always considering their well-being beyond their work responsibilities. Julie has instilled in me the courage to step outside my comfort zone, enhancing my skills as a clinician and researcher. She validates my feelings while helping me recognize my potential. Additionally, Julie has guided me through self-doubt, encouraging me to give myself credit for my hard work. Her best advice has been to not sell myself short and to celebrate my accomplishments, no matter how small they may seem.

Examples of Julie's impact as a mentor are highlighted by me going from being rather resistant to going through the promotion process to being more engaged. I also felt supported to navigate this process on my own timeline (taking into account personal and professional goals), while also feeling the process had been de-mystified and was more approachable"

One piece of advice I received from Julie to pass along is "When it comes to promotion, follow the rules and try to not personalize the process."

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT: Grady Advisory Group

The Grady Outpatient Advisory Board was formed several years ago with the purpose of improving the experience of all patients served at Grady Behavioral Health outpatient clinics.

Someone that has perspective about his or her experience in the clinic and is willing to share time and talent are ideal for membership. As a forum for patient representation around clinic issues, their input is valuable.

The board members are not shy about sharing the impact of clinic changes on them. Their experience with a change in the scheduling process contributed to a return to the

previous process. Another example of an issue that the board members addressed centered on providers leaving. As patients, in certain circumstances, they are not notified someone has left until after the person has gone. Members expressed the frustration of not being able to say goodbye or thank you to a provider. We talked about options and agreed to encourage writing a letter to the person that left, the clinic could then forward. As a clinic, we have also worked to make sure all patients are aware of the transition of residents and trainees. In collaboration with the Advisory Board, the group also hosts a Resident Goodbye Party for the patients and staff to attend. The latest project is working to improve follow ups from the inpatient unit. Since the group's inception, the goal of the Advisory Board has been to focus on patient engagement. So, the group is exploring options around going to the inpatient unit to connect with the future Park Place patients.

A favorite activity of the board is meeting with the new residents. A group of the board members have a panel discussion telling the residents about their own experience of being a patient in the clinic. This is always a lively, powerful discussion, that often gets referenced by the residents throughout the year.

The artistic members of the board are involved in keeping the bulletin boards fresh with inspiring messages.

Administration at Park Place has also called upon the members of the patient advisory board when the state wants a "patient perspective" on an issue like cultural sensitivity. Clinic director Nyasha Pace said, "The Grady Outpatient Advisory Board has been a wonderful addition to the clinic. The group of board members are enthusiastic and passionate about their contribution to the clinic and their insight helps to inform our operations. Through their advocacy and collective voice, we have been able to move closer to meeting the needs of all patients in care, regardless of where they are in their recovery."

Currently, the program is staffed by Jennifer Wootten and Tracy Clemons, who works as a Peer in the outpatient clinic. The board members do the work of setting the agenda. The role as moderators is to communicate with clinic leadership and staff about issues raised. My experience with the board has taught me a tremendous amount about advocacy. There have been lessons around what we can change, understanding the perspective of all sides and tailoring the intervention. I also am more attuned to shared decision making within sessions with patients because of a heightened awareness of the impact of clinical decisions on them.
