# **SPOTLIGHT: Andrea Crowell, MD**

Andrea Crowell, MD, is an Assistant Professor in Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, where she works in the Adult Outpatient Clinic, Treatment Resistant Depression Clinic and Resident Psychopharmacology Clinic supervising for the OPTP program. She also conducts research projects and sees patients in the DBS for Depression Program, as well as teaches an education grant-funded course for residents and medical students on managing patients who are agitated.

Andrea is an advanced candidate at the Emory University Psychoanalytic Institute on the psychoanalytic psychotherapy track, while serving on EUPI's curriculum and executive committees. In terms of her job, she most enjoys the flexibility to apply biological and psychodynamic frameworks for integrated care, and being able to teach residents to do the same.

After residency, Andrea did a research fellowship funded in part by the Lilly Research Fellowship Award. She also received an ABPN Innovation in Education Award for her interactive use of actors as standardized patients to teach trainees techniques for managing agitation. Most recently, she has been working on a project using machine learning to analyze video features from patient interviews with funding from the Emory Neuromodulation and Technology Center (ENTICe).

Andrea's future plans include the continued study of treatment resistant depression and recovery from depression, including analyzing non-verbal gestures and features extracted from video and audio analysis.

In her spare time Andrea enjoys reading, movies and yoga.

#### WELCOME NEW FACULTY

Jeffry Jaeger, PhD, is an Assistant Professor in Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. Jeffrey received his PhD in Clinical Psychology from the University of Washington, with an emphasis in treating anxiety disorders and complex clinical presentations. He completed a predoctoral internship at the University of California—San Diego/San Diego Veterans Affairs Healthcare System and a postdoctoral fellowship at the Durham VA Medical Center. Jeffrey has previously worked as Associate Director and Senior Staff Psychologist of the Kansas City Center for Anxiety, and as a Clinical Assistant Professor at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics. He has particular interest and expertise in individual and group treatments for Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), and treatment of complex clinical presentations with Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT). Jeffrey will be seeing adults with anxiety, mood and personality disorders in the Adult Outpatient Psychiatry Clinic.

Laura Jane Miller, MD, is an Assistant Professor in Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. Laura trained at Emory for undergraduate, medical school and fellowship for child and adolescent psychiatry. She left only briefly to fast track in adult psychiatry at the Cambridge Health Alliance, where she developed her interest in trauma and therapy, which first found its roots at the Nia project while in medical school. Just as she was leaving Boston for Emory, she learned of the field of infant parent mental health that promises to help heal intergenerational trauma. Upon wrapping up her training in child, Laura felt she still had much she wanted to learn about the first early years of development. Emory offered to support her pursuit of knowledge by attending the UMASS Boston Infant Parent Mental Health Fellowship Program that brings in luminary speakers from the world round. Laura is also taking time each week to help create a clinic focused on ages 0-5.

Alainia Morgan-James, MD, FAPA, recently joined the Emory University School of Medicine as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. She graduated from SUNY Upstate Medical University College of Medicine in Syracuse, NY. She completed her general psychiatry residency at the University of Maryland/Sheppard Pratt Residency Program. While there she served as chief resident for the Consultation-Liaison and Psychiatric Emergency Services. She then went on to complete a Consultation-Liaison Fellowship at Georgetown University Hospital/National Institute of Mental Health/Washington Hospital Center. Dr. Yasinski earned her PhD from the University of Delaware and completed her clinical internship at the Medical College of Georgia and Charlie Norwood VA Medical Center consortium in Augusta, Georgia. She completed her postdoctoral fellowship with the Emory Healthcare Veterans Program. Dr. Yasinski's clinical interests are in cognitive-behavioral and mindfulness-based approaches to treating PTSD, depression, and anxiety disorders. Her research interests focus on better understanding the process of change during psychotherapy for PTSD and depression, and investigating ways to enhance treatment response for difficult-to-treat patients with these disorders.

## Research

The overarching goal of the Emory SCORE is to advance the quality of women's health research by leveraging the rich, collaborative and interdisciplinary research environment at Emory University to grow NIH and other extramurally funded research in women's health, focusing on infectious disease, and normalize the inclusion of gender/sex as a variable in social and biomedical research.

Here is the text from the abstract we submitted for our specific research project: Sex hormones are influential in setting the tone of immune responses and estradiol exhibits a particularly strong influence that varies across the life cycle in women. Although largely anti-inflammatory and protective, estradiol can have divergent effects and the influence and availability of estradiol changes with aging, most notably with the menopause transition. Furthermore, exposure to stressors can impact the functions of sex hormones. Women living with HIV (WLH) may be more vulnerable to the effects of stress and trauma exposure on the interactions of stress hormones and sex hormones on inflammatory pathways due to the constant systemic challenge of living with HIV. The proposed studies will further our understanding of the biology of aging, and specifically the prognosis of WLH, and characterize the link between immunosenescence and endocrinesenescence. The planned research will define estrogen deficiency at both the systemic and receptor level and evaluate the extent to which global variation in these parameters predicts pro-inflammatory pathways in WLH. We will conduct clinical interviews to assess trauma exposure and traumarelated hyperarousal to examine how these factors interact with HIV to exacerbate estrogen deficiency and inflammation. Furthermore, we will characterize the influence of trauma exposure and estrogen receptor function on inflammation at molecular level in WLH. Overall, the data generated from this proposal will provide critical information about the influence of estradiol signaling in the inflammation in WLH. Because trauma exposure and its related adverse mental health outcomes (i.e. posttraumatic stress disorder; PTSD) are poorly controlled in WLH, and PTSD has dangerous implications for HIV pathogenesis and transmission, it is of critical importance to identify the effects of trauma and PTSD comorbid with HIV in order to titrate the most effective treatment approaches for this complex comorbidity.
